Q. 2 Answer the following parts in about 50 to 60 words each:

(6x4=24)

- (i) If we live under a progressive government, it makes us reactionary, if we live under reactionary government, it turns us into socialists. Debate this statement in the light of "The Limits of Human Power".
- (ii) A great town – a town whose activities alone are equal to all the labour of a city like Leeds – all devoted to the service of a god, who lies there, mystic, wonderful, waiting to speak his oracles to men". Elaborate the statement in the light of "The Great God Gun".
- (iii) Education, except where the pupils are encouraged to make things with their own hands, is mainly spoon feeding, says W.R. Inage in Spoon Feeding. Comment.
- (iv) Why does the author say, "A bathroom ought to be equipped for comfort, like drawing room" in the essay "Abut Bathrooms"? Comment.
- (v) What does the writer mean by "moderation and not excess as the golden rule of his life" with reference to "How to Live Long"?
- (vi) Why did the colliers avoid rational aspect of life? Answer by keeping in mind "My Early Home" by D.H. Lawrence.

Elaborate the concept and history of agitation with reference to, "Landlords and Industrial Employers" by G.B. Shaw.

- (ii) We know that man is not all mercy, pity, peace, and love. Discuss whether Blake is justified in making us to love all other men, even if we admit that these divine qualities are embodied in human form.
- (iii) What is the substance of Milton's complaint and how does he answer his own complaint?

- (i) For Mercy, Pity, Peace and Love

- (ii) Blow, blow, thou winter wind,

Q. 6 Read the following passage carefully and answer the questions appended to it:

The rapid pace of life has extracted every drop of energy out of him. Gone are the days of relaxation and rest. Today, everybody is caught up in the snare of the endless tasks which continue to the end of man. The facilities of life have increased but the quality of life has fallen. The cure of diseases has been discovered but quality of health has declined. It is, therefore, discussed whether we are really happier than our forefathers. Doesn't science create ten problems while it solves one? Do we ever see the true picture of science in the use of ammunition?
